NEW RAMAZ BUILDING DEDICATED AT IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES

The new Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School of Ramaz, which is housed in the Morris and Ida Newman Educational Center on East 78th Street, between Park and Madison Avenues, was formally dedicated before over 600 enthusiastic friends of the school on Sunday morning, November 2. A capacity crowd filled the new auditorium, enjoyed the moving and well-timed program and then proceeded through the building to see the beautiful facilities which are now available to students in the Ramaz Up-School.

The program was headed by the Attorney General of the State of New York, Hon. Robert Abrams, a parent at the school; Hon. Harrison J. Goldin, Comptroller of the City of New York and an alumnus of Ramaz; and Hon. Paul Kedar, Consul General of the State of Israel in New York, who is also a Ramaz parent. Lawrence A. Kobrin, Chairman of the Board of Ramaz School and himself an alumnus of one of the earliest classes in Ramaz and a current parent, presided.

One of the most moving moments in the program came when Jacob Chachkes, President of the High School G.O., spoke to the assembly. He was followed by Victoria Lindenbaum, of the 8th grade who is President of the Student Organization of the Junior High School and who delivered an inspiring message. Vicki is the daughter of two Ramaz alumni Belda and Marcel Lindenbaum and the granddaughter of Mrs. Rita Kaufman in whose husband's memory the auditorium in the new school will be med.

RABBI IRVING GREENBERG TO BE FIRST SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE ON SHABBAT OF THANKSGIVING WEEKEND

FAMILY DINNER TO BE HELD FRIDAY EVENING

The first Scholar in Residence Shabbat and Friday Evening Family Dinner will be held November 28 and 29, the Shabbat of Thanksgiving weekend. Dr. Irving "Yitz" Greenberg will make three presentations to the congregation. Following Kabbalat Shabbat services and a Friday Evening Family Dinner, Professor Greenberg will speak on: ORTHODOX JUDAISM AND THE HOLOCAUST. He will discuss the religious challenge of the holocaust, including the split among orthodox thinkers about how to comprehend such an event.

On Saturday morning, Rabbi Greenberg will speak from the pulpit during Shabbat morning services on: THE RELIGIOUS SIGNIFICANCE OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL. He will discuss this in the light of a new redemption in our lifetime and explore the theology and *halakha* of the State. He will consider Israel as the proof of the ongoing covenant and analyze the religious significance of the secular.

Between Mincha (4:00 PM) and Maariv services on Saturday afternoon, Dr. Greenberg will speak on the topic: TOWARD A NEW BIRTH OF HALAKHA, OR THE HALAKHA OF EVERYDAY LIFE. Halakhic living and the incorporating of the holocaust and Israel into the religious calendar and in daily observance will highlight a discussion that includes case studies in making everyday life holy. He will focus on affluence, sexuality and the work ethic.

"YITZ GREENBERG"

An ordained orthodox rabbi, scholar and prominent lecturer, "Yitz" Greenberg is one of the most dynamic and outspoken leaders of the American Jewish community today. He em-

phasizes the necessity for Jews to bridge the ideological gap separating observant and secular Jews in order to create a lifestyle which blends traditional and modern approaches. An eminent thinker and educator in the field of holocaust studies, he has served as Director of the President's Commission on the Holocaust.

In 1974, Dr. Greenberg and Elie Wiesel founded the National Jewish Resource Center, a unique Jewish institution dedicated to the creative survival of Jewish life. It reflects Dr. Greenberg's interest in bridging Jewish religious and organizational divisions for the sake of klal Yisroel, the unity and totality of the Jewish people.

Rabbi Greenberg was graduated summa cum laude from Brooklyn College, and earned both Master's and Doctorate Degrees from Harvard University. He directed the Brandeis University Hillel Foundation, served as Associate Professor of History at Yeshiva University and as Fulbright Professor of History at Tel Aviv University. While serving as the Rabbi of the Riverdale Jewish Center, he founded the Department of Jewish Studies at City College of the City University of New York. Dr. Greenberg currently serves as a Professor in that department.

To give you an idea of what kind of an exng traordinary man Rabbi Steinsaltz is, H, we quote from a full page article on re him which appeared in Newsweek last er May. "Jewish lore is filled with tales of formidable rabbis. Probably none livat ing today can compare in genius and ad influence to Adin Steinsaltz, 42, whose in extraordinary gifts as scholar, teacher, scientist, writer, mystic and social critic have attracted disciples from every facou tion in Israeli society. Steinsaltz is renowned chiefly for producing - on his own - a modern Hebrew translation of the Babylonian Talmud that, together with his lucid commentary, will for the first time make that library of Jewish theology and law accessible to the average person. He has also written widely on science fiction, archaelogy, mysticism and zoology and he is currently advising Jerusalem's Biblical Zoo on the reconstruction of Noah's Ark.

"When he is not writing, Steinsaltz is talking. Last year, he spoke at the Aspen Institute for Humanistic Studies and at Yale University. In Jerusalem, his evening seminars, which usually last until two in the morning, attract devoted followers... scholars and students from around the world. A frequent radio commentator, Steinsaltz discourses easily on contemporary films, French literature and Israeli politics. 'He is a genius of the highest order, marvels Dan Segre, a Professor of International Relations of Haifa University. 'Steinsaltz has the sort of mind that comes around only every couple of thousand years."

PROCEDURES FOR LIGHTING CHANUKAH CANDLES

Beginning with Tuesday Evening, December 2

While the practice of gift giving has become an itegral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principal observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

The following are a few items which should be kept in mind:

- 1. The Menorah While one Menorah suffices for the household, it is customary -- and desirable — for each member of the household to light his own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children in the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah lamps.
- 2. The Time for Lighting The candles should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 minutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at least 30 minutes.

On Saturday night at home, the candles are lit after Havdalah. On Friday afternoon, they are lit before the Sabbath candles and they should be large enough so that they will remain lit for about an hour and a half

- 3. Arranging the Candles The candles are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candle lighter faces it. Each night an additional candle is
- 4. Lighting the Candles The candles are lit from left to right - starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash." Then the blessings are recited — three on the first night and two on the other nights. After the blessings are recited, we light the candles by the flame of the "Shamash".

The reason for using the "Shamash" is in order to avoid any practical use of the Chanukah candles. These lights are holy and their sole purpose is a ritual one - to proclaim the miracle of Chanukah.

5. Concluding Songs - Following the lighting of the candles, we sing ha-Nerot ha-Lalu, which explains the reason for the ceremony, and Maoz Tzur, a ballad which describes in several stanzas how Divine Providence has intervened at various points in history to save us from our enemies.



WORLD GATHERING OF JEWISH HOLOCAUST **SURVIVORS**

On June 15-18, 1981 the World Gathering of Jewish Holocaust Survivors will take place in Jerusalem, Israel. This event, which is being sponsored by survivors' associations throughout the world, leading Israeli and international Jewish agencies, and the Second Generation: Children of Holocaust Survivors, promises to be one of major historical significance.

The program includes a memorial service at the Yad Vashem memorial museum, gatherings at the kibbutzim founded by survivors of the holocaust, and a candlelight march through the streets of Jerusalem to the Western Wall where a testament of the survivors will be passed on to the second generation. Plans also include special programs for all members of the second generation, who will be coming from around the world to meet one another both at formal sessions and informally.

This gathering, the likes of which will take place only once in the history of mankind, is of crucial importance. First, it serves as a pilgrimage of remembrance. Second, it is a manifestation of the perseverance of the survivors, and the commitment to life they have passed on to their children. Third, and very important in these troubled times, it will serve as an expression of our solidarity with Israel and with our fellow Jews around the world.
