DR. HARRY GOLDIN, ASHER LEVITSKY AND GEORGE BAUMGARTEN TO BE HONORED AS CHATANIM ON SIMCHAT TORAH

We are proud to announce in the name of the Officers of the congregation the designation of Dr. Harry Goldin, Asher Levitsky and George Baumgarten as Chatanim for this coming Simchat Torah. They will be inducted into their honorary offices on Saturday, October 21, Shemini Atzeret. They will be called to the Torah for their special honors on the following day.

Chatan Torah

The highest Torah honor of the year will go to Dr. Harry Goldin, one of the most senior members of the congregation. Born in Russia in 1898, Dr. Goldin studied in the Slutzker Yeshiva where Rabbi Issar Zalman Meltzer was the Rosh Yeshiva. Upon coming to the United States, Dr. Goldin studied at CCNY and received his medical degree from the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University in 1924. Since that time he has served the community as a gastroenterologist and he has been associated continuously with Montefiore Hospital.

Dr. Goldin studied for many years with Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik whose shiurim on the West Side he attended regularly. A Hebraist from his early childhood in Russia, he taught Hebrew in this country to support himself in medical school.

In 1928 he married the former Anna Eskolsky, the daughter of the late Rabbi Jacob Eskolsky. Their children, Dr. Gurston Goldin, Jessica Stern and Harrison J. (Yakov) Goldin, are all graduates of the Ramaz Elementary School and have gone on to Jewish and community service with distinction. The Goldins have seven grandsons and one granddaughter who is a graduate of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine and who is following in the footsteps of her grandfather as a physician.

It is a source of pride to our congregation to be able to honor a man of Torah scholarship and piety as Chatan Torah this year.

Our Chatan Bereishit this year, Asher Levitsky, comes from a family with a tradition of service to the Jewish community. He is a native of Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, where his family was very active in the Jewish community, following in the footsteps of his paternal grandfather who was a leader of the Jewish community in Montreal during most of the first four decades of this century.

Asher currently serves the congregation as President of the Men's Club and he is a former President of the Couples Club as well. He also is the Gabbai of our Auditorium Service on the High Holy Days, and for the last several years he has been the volunteer director of our Sukkah meals program with great skill, patience and love.

A corporate and securities lawyer by profession, Asher is a partner in the law firm of Esanu, Katsky, Korins, and Siger. Of course, his greatest area of expertise is as an amateur chef (he would deny the adjective amateur).

Asher is married to the former Iris Wolfe of New Bedford, Massachusetts. Both of them have been active in many aspects of congregational life, including the creation of a Chavura. Their son Joshua, formerly of Ramaz, is now a Junior at the Robert Louis Stevenson School, while their daughter Lily, is a student in Form II at the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School.

It is a pleasure and a privilege to pay tribute to someone who has given so unstintingly of himself to this community by bestowing upon him the Chatan Bereishit honor in this season.

Our Chatan Maftir has been worshipping in Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun for the past forty years, since his early childhood. In fact, he first came to our synagogue on Simchat Torah 5710 (1949).

George is a graduate of Ramaz, which he also has served with distinction as Trustee. He holds a B.A. in political science from Yeshiva University and he is Founder and President of Travel Routes International Corp. in midtown Manhattan. He also serves as United Nations correspondent for the Jewish Week and several other publications and he has been active for many years in UJA-Federation, the Congressional Caucus Committee of New York AIPAC, and as a member of the Advisory Council of the New York Board of Rabbis. He is also on the Executive Board of Mid-Pac, with which many of our members are affiliated and the KJ Political Affairs committee.

The son of Estelle Baumgarten, a former President of our Sisterhood, and the late Harry W. Baumgarten who served as President of our congregation, George has been very active in the life of this community and he is also one of our finest Torah readers. His younger brother, Fred, is of course the Treasurer of KJ.

George's wife, the former Roberta Caplan of Pittsburgh, has also joined actively in the life of Kehilath Jeshurun. She now serves as Co-President of our Couples Club and is a member of the National Women's Young Leadership Cabinet of UJA. Roberta is following in the footsteps of her mother and father who have been leading participants in Jewish communal life in Pittsburgh.

Hoshanah Rabbah services will be held Friday, October 20 at 6:45 am in the Main Synagogue.

Hoshanah Rabbah traditionally marks the close of the penitential season. For that occasion, the Cantor is robed in his white *kittel*. Many of the melodies of the High Holy Days are sung. The congregation makes seven circuits around the Bimah with *lulav* and *etrog*, and finally, of course, the *Aravot* are taken and eventually used in their customary colorful fashion.

Following the service, Stanley Gurewitsch, President of the Congregation and his wife Rae, will sponsor breakfast in the Sukkah for all who are in attendance. It will have the traditional fare, embellished for the *Yom Tov*.

This will be followed by further singing and a brief Torah discourse. Following this part of the evening, we will *bench* together and conclude the festivities.

We hope that the spirit of Hakafot Unlimited will help us usher in a year of joy and happiness—unlimited—with the Torah as our inspiration.

"DEAD POETS SOCIETY"**

In our highly pressured world, where children grow up with great expectations on the part of their parents, a movie like "Dead Poets Society" makes us stop and think about the price that we may be paying for the pressure we place on our children.

The film is beautiful simply as a story, and the screenplay and acting are very impressive. It is, however, also important as a visual reminder for parents, children and educators. It speaks of course, as art usually does, in exaggerated terms; but it touches on some of the most important issues in education today: openness to new ideas, original thinking, unbearable pressure on students to perform, and the terribly unfair stake that parents sometimes have in their children's success. When a movie can touch on all of these issues in a non-moralistic way and be beautifully acted, filmed and spoken at the same time, it is something of great value.

Audrey and I enjoyed seeing the movie this past summer and thinking about its implications. We recommend it to you as worthy of your attention. It is, of course, a matter of some pride to us that the producer of the film is Steven Haft, a member of our congregation whose wife, Lisa Birnbach Haft, grew up in our community. Steven has made a valuable contribution to contemporary life and the exploration of some of the important issues that are part of that life.

SUPPORT NEEDED FOR SOVIET EMIGRES

As the New York Jewish community braces for an explosive increase in Soviet Jewish emigration, UJA-Federation's special Passage to Freedom campaign for Soviet Jews assumes ever greater importance. Some 10,000 Soviet Jews are expected to arrive in Israel this year, up from 2,000 a year ago. A further loosening of Soviet emigration restrictions could bring as many as 800,000 Jews to Israel over the next decade, according to Israeli experts.

Intensive efforts continue in New York and Jerusalem to provide these immigrants with housing, jobs, education, and other emergency assistance. UJA-Federation domestic and overseas agencies dealing with Soviet resettlement are under severe financial strain that will only worsen as immigrant numbers increase.

That is what makes the Passage to Freedom drive, now at \$7.5 million, so essential. Soviet Jewish emigration, already reaching record numbers, remains precarious, ever subject to Moscow's whims.

The time to show support is now, while the gates to freedom remain open.
