
From The Rabbi's Desk

In our present climate of sophisticated cynicism, American patriotism is a term very rarely considered and spoken about. We complain about taxes, take sides concerning Vietnam, cast our ballot during elections and generally take our country and its ideals fairly much for granted. However, from a Jewish his-torical perspective, we are living under a govern-ment unparalleled in its concern for the religious rights of a minority group, especially those of the Jewish minority.

We have been a people without a country during the twenty centuries between the year 70 C.E. (with the Destruction of the Second Temple) and 1948 (with the establishment of the modern State of Israel). During this two-thousand-year-long exile we have experienced every manner of persecution and expulsion, discrimination and pogrom. The United States of America is the only nation on the globe which has never shed a drop of innocent Jewish blood under government sanction. How our ancestors would have marveled at a country with a Christian majority which appoints a man named Goldberg as its spokesman in the forum of nations, and which is even discussing the possibility of nominating a Jewish Vice-President!

It is for this reason that the Festival of Thanksgiving should have for us a deeply religious as well as national significance. We should utilize the day as one of profound dedication to the principles for which our nation stands, and characterize its observance with thanks to the God who found for us here a temporary haven from official policies of anti-Semitism and Judenrein. In my own home the traditional turkey dinner is preceded by the following prayer for the welfare of our nation which is re-cited over a cup of wine. It is especially fitting that the Thanksgiving feast be initiated with the blessing over bread and concluded with the Birchat Ha-Maron (Grace over mean page 3).

"WHAT'S NEW ON THE RIALTO" By VICKY RISKIN

Movie Review By Suzanne Davis

"Good Times, Wonderful Times" is an ironic and shattering film concerned with the many aspects of twentieth century morality. It is a tale of the effects on our sensibilities caused by World War I, World War II, and the fear of a third World War. In this caused by World War I, world War II, and the fear of a third World War.

In his prize-winning film, producer-director Lionel Rogosin focuses on an actual cocktail party attended by real, successful, "in-people," not actors. Thus we see the Joneses of our society at a real drinking party (not a studio set), and the words they speak are what they are and how they think. This is shocking and convincing simply because these people are themselves.

Thus in typical cocktail party fashion the pseudo-intellectual gab flows, reflecting a glib, know-it-all, lack of involvement in today's issues. A beautiful, prosperous

a gilo, know-it-ail, lack of involvement in today's issues. A beautiful, prosperous young woman answers the question of the imminence of war by stating that "war is inevitable; it's nature's way of keeping the population down!" And her blasé delivery of the line tells us that she believes this!

And then some even greater horror. The camera immediately switches to sequences of the Warsaw Ghetto, where rubbish collectors pile the staring and starving faces of dead Jews onto carts, and film clips of children of Hiroshima, skin ripped from their bodies, crying for their dead, bleeding mothers. Is war truly the answer to the nonulation explosion? population explosion?

Throughout the film the camera jockeys from the inhuman and indifferent words of the liquor guzzlers ("It's terribly exhilarating to have someone in your rifle sights and say, 'I could kill you or not'"), to brutal footage (mass killings at Dachau). The film progresses in this point-counterpoint fashion. The slick, well-educated, monied party guests chatter indifferently on the subjects of promiscuity, war, the bomb, the army, and bullfighting, and as soon as one of the crowd betrays his apathy towards matters of basic humanity, the camera cuts away to film clips of the shattering realities of modern history. realities of modern history.

The one ray of hope and sensibility appears in the form of a young peace marcher who has been pushed into a corner by the party's pseudo-sophisticate-moderates. "There are those who let these things happen, and there are those who stop them from happening!" he screams. But in keeping with the evening's bitter irony, he is

rom happening: he screams, but in keeping with the evening's ditter frony, he is virtually unsupported.

This film is absorbing, provocative, devastating, and certainly didactic. It is difficult for a "feeling" individual to watch the screen without giving in to gasps, tears, and soul-searching. It is almost impossible for a Jew to watch without approaching—if not reaching—hysteria. This is not a "fun"movie, but it is a searing representation of twentieth century smugness and amorality, and it cries to be seen and cried over. For are these truly "Good Times, Wonderful Times?"
