## From The Rabbi's Desk

It is incumbent upon the Jew to drink on Purim until he can no longer distinguish between blessing Haman and cursing Mordechai. This particular commandment has perplexed Jewish commentaries throughout the ages, and has even caused Maimonides to maintain that one should drink until one falls asleep, but not until one actually becomes inebriated. After all, it is unthinkable that "the holy nation and kingdom of priests" be anything but completely sober upon any given day of the year! And yet despite the discomfort of many commentaries, the plain meaning of the law certainly is that the Jew become a bit "high" on the day of Purim in celebration of the Jewish victory over anti-semitism in the diaspora of Persia.

In order to understand this paradoxical command, it is necessary to reread the Book of Ecclesiastes (Kohelet). According to the Midrash, King Solomon wrote this scroll of wisdom towards the end of his life, after he had experienced the various pleasures and disappointments of life. It is an existential philosophic memoir, whose mood shifts from hedonism to pessimism, from idealism to nihilism. And as the conclusion of all his vacillation, the author declares:

"The end of the matter, all having been heard: fear God, and keep His commandments. *This is the whole man.*"

King Solomon had attempted to live by every one of the known "isms" of his day, and found that each of them contained an important kernel of truth. But none of them en-

## Purim Law and Lore

1. *Purim Seudah* — A glorious repast in honor of the holiday. It is incumbent upon every Jew to eat, drink and make merry in celebration of Purim. The feast should begin during the day, Thursday, March 14, and extend into the night. Wine (and even a little schnapps) must be an integral element of the meal, and our Sages have taught: One may drink on Purim until he can no longer distinguish between the blessing of Mordecai and the curse of Haman." (Maimonides interprets this to mean that one should merely drink and fall asleep, for sleep makes intelligent distinction impossible).
2. *Mishloach Manot* — The sending of portions. Each person must send at least two gifts (two types of food ready to be eaten) to his neighbor. The custom is to send gifts through a messenger.
3. *Matanot L'Evyonim* — *Gifts to the Poor*. Every Jew, even if he be among the poorest in Israel, must give at least two gifts to the poor people (one gift to each indigent).
4. *Kriyat Ha Megillah* — Public Reading of the Scroll of Esther. The Megillah should be read on the eve and morning of Purim. It is customary for the children to drown out the name of Haman by sounding their "greggers" (noisemakers) whenever his name is read from the Scroll.
5. *Special Sabbaths*: There are four different Sabbaths during the year on which a special Maftir is read:  
*Shabbat Shekalim* — the Sabbath before Rosh Chodesh Adar is so designated, because during Temple times each Jew was called upon to give one half *shekel* as a poll tax on the first day of Adar. As a reminder of this duty, the passage from Exodus 30 is read as the Maftir.  
*Shabbat Za Khor* — the Sabbath before Purim derives this name from the Maftir read on this day which begins with the word *Za Khor* — "Remember Amalek." According to Jewish tradition, Haman was an Amalekite.  
*Shabbat Parah* — On the Sabbath before the season of Nissan (the month of Passover) the laws concerning the proper steps to become ritually clean are read, so that each Jew would be enabled to partake of the Passover sacrifice. The red heifer, or *Parah Adumah*, was a necessary aspect of the ritual.  
*Shabbat Hachodesh* — On the Sabbath closest to Rosh Chodesh Nissan we read "Hachodesh Hazeh" to remind the people of the coming Pesach.

Special thanks to *I. Arthur Rosenberg* for having so ably conducted and participated in our "Literary Interlude." Not only did he introduce our various guest lecturers, but his wide scope of erudition caused him to serve as a discussant for each of our lectures. Mr. Rosenberg has a doctorate in law, is listed in "Who's Who in American Jewry", and will honor us with a lecture in the future on "Biblical Influence on English and American Law and Government."

Our own Cantor *Goffin* sings "Yerushalayim Shel Zahav" (Jerusalem of Gold) on the new recording "The Mark III Orchestra, Vol. Z." In addition to his solo, the Cantor is lead voice for the other vocal selections. The record features new Chassidic and Israeli songs and may be ordered through the Synagogue office. Cantor Goffin recently lectured on The Development of Congregational Melodies according to Traditional Modes (Nusach)" for the Cantorial Council of America, an affiliate of Yeshiva University, where he serves as Secretary . . . .

*Rabbi Riskin* recently lectured at the City College Hillel on "The New Morality," addressed the New York Regional Yavneh Convention (Yavneh is the religious student campus organization on whose National Advisory Board the Rabbi serves) on "Prophet and Priest in the Twentieth Century," and presented a Memorial Lecture in Memory of Rebitzen Lazar, past President of Women's Branch, in Providence, Rhode Island . . . . Rumor has it that Rabbi Riskin is concluding Harry Kemelman's trilogy with a novel entitled: "Saturday Afternoon the Rabbi Slept late." . . . . A three-year-old Synagogue in the new community of University City, Pennsylvania, has been disputing the religious direction which it ought pursue. The majority of the membership is far removed from traditional Judaism although most of the constituents are involved in the University of Pennsylvania as faculty or students. Three of the most concerned couples spent a Shabbat with us, and became thoroughly con-

vinced that traditional, halachic Judaism can have great meaning and relevance for even the twentieth-century marginally affiliated Jew. It should fill us all with pride to know that although we are a comparatively young congregation ourselves, we have already been instrumental in directing three Synagogues in their religious development.

### FROM THE REBBITZEN'S TABLE . .

Since so many prominent members of L.S.S. are watching their waistlines, I have decided this year to present a Weight-Watchers Purim Seudah menu.

For the "Le Chayim" may I suggest a "Virgin Mary"-tomato juice sans vodka, or Soda-on-the-rocks (dietetic, of course). Start the meal with  $\frac{1}{2}$  grapefruit for an appetizer. Soup is possible and this one is a guaranteed success:

#### Sweet and sour cabbage soup

1. Shred  $\frac{1}{2}$  cabbage
2. Shred one peeled delicious apple.
3. Put 2 stalks of celery through the blender with some tomato juice.
4. Add all ingredients to one quart of tomato juice and season to taste with sugar-substitute, salt, pepper and parsley flakes.
5. Simmer in a covered pot for  $\frac{3}{4}$  to 1 hour. Serves 4-6 people.

#### For the main course

I suggest 'Victorian Veal Balls.'

1. Allow  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  lb. ground veal per person.
2. Season raw meat very well with plenty of salt, pepper, garlic and onion powder, paprika, bay leaf powder, ac'cent, oregano and whatever you think would dress up the veal which is extremely bland.
3. Mix seasonings and meat well and form into small balls.
4. Cut up a green pepper into 1 inch squares (allow one average pepper to 1 pound of meat) and wash and slice fresh mushrooms (allow  $\frac{1}{3}$  lb. to 1 lb. meat).
5. Place meat balls and vegetables in a large frying pan or Dutch oven and then pour in enough tomato juice to cover pan to depth of  $\frac{1}{4}$  to  $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Cover and simmer for 20-30 minutes.

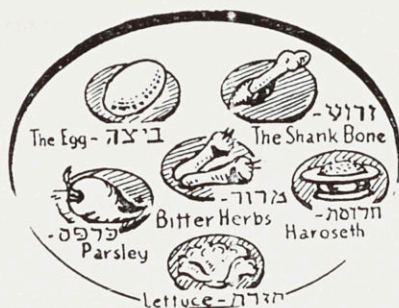

## Seder

Please remember to reserve the second Seder Night, Saturday, April 13, at 8:00 P.M. *promptly* in the Hotel Esplanade, for the *Lincoln Square Synagogue Community Seder*. Wolf Reichard is diligently preparing an inspiring event which should not be missed. Our Rabbi and Cantor will officiate, and the traditional melodies complete with English explanations and readings should make this a most edifying experience. The children of the Hebrew School are busily preparing Passover songs, and each individual table will have ample opportunity to participate.

Send in your reservations as quickly as possible (\$15.00 for adults, \$10.00 for children) so that adequate arrangements can be made by our committee.

*Wives and Mothers*: This is your opportunity to sit and be served for at least one Seder night. There's nothing wrong with being a "back-seat baalabusta" once a year!

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**Rebbitzen's Table (Cont'd)**

As a side dish I would serve peas, peas and carrots or acorn squash. This dark green ridged vegetable is an absolutely delicious substitute for sweet potatoes if prepared in the following way:

1. Cut medium size squash in half with a sharp knife.
2. Scoop out the pits.
3. Fill a shallow dish with  $\frac{1}{2}$ " water seasoned with 1 tsp. vanilla.  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. liquid sugar substitute and a few shakes of Pumpkin Pie Spice.
4. Place squash halves, open side down in the water of the pan.
5. Bake in moderate oven till the inside pulp is soft (about  $\frac{3}{4}$  hours).
6. To serve, scoop out contents of shell and season with salt and pepper to taste. One squash serves two.

A fitting royal dessert to this meal would be nice red sweet baked apples. To prepare apples, core and fill hollow space with cream or cherry flavored low calorie soda and bake in a moderate oven until soft (about  $\frac{3}{4}$  hour). These apples are delicious piping hot as well as ice cold. Tea makes the best accompanying beverage.

So — enjoy Purim in gay dietetic abandon with no guilt feelings the next day.
