From The Rabbi's Desk

A great deal has been written of late about the rise of Anti-Semitism in New York City in particular and throughout America in general. Those of us with friends and relatives in Israel have begun to receive Israeli letters voicing concern for the safety of the American Jewish Community. Even an integral part of Jewish literary America like *Commentary Magazine* has recently published an article suggesting that "it can happen here." One of the major concerns facing our Jewish Organizations is finding the proper response to Anti-Semitism in order to successfully combat and extirpate it.

First of all, let us never delude ourselves into thinking that we can become ostrich-like and the problem will go away. Hate breeds on fear, and we must unequivocally let it be known by words as well as by deeds — that we demand our freedom to live as Jews in this country of freedom. Even more important, however, must be our determination to live as Jews. If a teacher broadcasts a poem on Station WBAI scorning the Jew "with a yarmulka on his head," Jews must wear skull-caps with all the more pride. Ludwig Lewisohn correctly noted that the greatest proof of American democracy is not that an assimilated Felix Frankfurter could become a Justice of the Supreme Court, but that a committed Jew with beard, payot, kaftan and shtreimel (earlocks, black coat and fur hat) can walk the streets of New York unmolested.

Purim Law and Lore

- Purim Seudah A glorious repast in honor of the holiday. It is incumbent upon every Jew to eat, drink and make merry in celebration of Purim. The feast should begin during the day. Tuesday, March 4, and extend into the night. Wine (and even a little schnapps) must be an integral element of the meal, and our Sages have taught: One may drink on Purim until he can no longer distinguish between the blessing of Mordecai and the curse of Haman." (Maimonides interprets this to mean that one should merely drink and fall asleep, for sleep makes intelligent distinction impossible).
- 2. *Mishloach Manot* The sending of portions. Each person must send at least two gifts (two types of food ready to be eaten) to his neighbor. The custom is to send gifts through a messenger.
- 3. *Matanot L'Evyonim Gifts to the Poor.* Every Jew, even if he be among the poorest in Israel, must give at least two gifts to the poor people (one gift to each indigent).
- 4. Kriyat Ha Megillah Public Reading of the Scroll of Esther. The Megillah should be read on the eve and morning of Purim. It is customary for the children to drown out the name of Haman by sounding their "greggers" (noisemakers) whenever his name is read from the Scroll.
- 5. Special Sabbaths: There are four different Sabbaths during the year on which a special Maftir is read:

Shabbat Shekalim — the Sabbath before Rosh Chodesh Adar is so designated, because during Temple times each Jew was called upon to give one half *shekel* as a poll tax on the first day of Adar. As a reminder of this duty, the passage from Exodus 30 is read as the Maftir.

Shabbat Za Khor — the Sabbath before Purim derives this name from the Maftir read on this day which begins with the word Za Khor — "Remember Amalek." According to Jewish tradition, Haman was an Amalekite.

Shabbat Parah — On the Sabbath before the season of Nissan (the month of Passover) the laws concerning the proper steps to become ritually clean are read, so that each Jew would be enabled to partake of the Passover sacrifice. The red heifer, or *Parah Adumah*, was a necessary aspect of the ritual.

Shabbat Hachodesh — On the Sabbath closest to Rosh Chodesh Nissan we read "Hachodesh Hazeh" to remind the people of the coming Pesach.

Rav Shlomo Goren, Chief Chaplain of the Israeli Defense Forces and Chief Rabbi of Tel Aviv and Jaffa, was guest speaker at an Israeli Bond Breakfast, tendered by the Lincoln Square Synagogue in honor of our Third Vice-President Wolf Reichard. Ray Goren, traditionally regal in his black-white beard and fearlessly proud in his military regalia, told us of the great Shofar which he was privileged to sound as the first Jew to liberate the Western Wall. Israel could not be better represented than by this militant Talmudist, who was presented by Mr. Reichard with a golden tie-pin and cufflink set in the replica of our new Synagogue. Wolf Reichard spoke with tears in his eyes of his long journey from Auschwitz to Lincoln Square, and thanked the Almighty for fulfilling the 2000 year Jewish dream in his lifetime. Many bonds were bought, and LSS was indeed proud of its homeland in Israel and of its Third Vice President in America . . . Contrary to early reports, Wolf Reichard did not cater his own breakfast (although he wanted to: after all, why should anyone go to trouble for him?). The Sisterhood did a marvelous job! . . . Jay Brown's Bar-Mitzvah stretched the walls of LSS to their limits. Sixty guests caused us to open a second Minyan across the hall under the leadership of Elmer Klein, Morris Tiefenbrunn and Aron Landau. Mirabile dictu, everyone had a seat - even when a group entered the main Synagogue for the Rabbi's sermon. Jay Brown davened Shacharit and read the Maftir in addition to chanting a flawless haf-

tarah. LSS Hebrew School must be doing something right . . . Rabbi Avraham Piatelli, Chief Rabbi of Venice, spoke to us during a capacity-filled Oneg Shabbat on "The Italian Jewish Community and the Pope." Strangely enough, this Chief Rabbi looked even younger than our own . . . M. Z. Frank, noted Columnist and author, likewise packed an Oneg Shabbat for "The Nixon Administration and the State of Israel" . . . stereotype today without being referred to a good psychiatrist. It is now quite acceptable for the Jew to attempt to integrate himself with the goyim by condemning what he has always been ashamed of it. It is a sad sight.

We are living in a time of exploding nationalism. The Blacks in America are the first to abjure the idea of assimilation, to realize the inherent lie in the concept of the melting-pot. Through Black nationalism has developed a new pride and hence the ticket to liberation.

Today's young American Jew is a good bit slower. He desperately wants assimilation; Jewishness embarasses him. He finds the idea of Jewish nationalism, Israel notwithstanding, laughable.

The leftist Jewish student is today's Uncle Tom. He scrapes along, demonstrating for a John Hatchett, ashamed of his identity, and obsessed with it. He cannot accept the fact that he is seen as a Jew, that his destiny is that of the Jews, and that his only effectiveness is as a Jew. But he wants to be an "American," a leftist American, talking liberation and aspiring WASP. He is a ludicrous figure.

He can learn this much from the Jewish experience. When they slaughtered six million of us, the good people offered us sympathy, and nothing else. They uttered brotherly noises. It was when the fighting Jews arose from the blood and ashes of Europe that we began to lose our friends. The world began to accept our national existence but was prepared to mourn our imminent demise. Who can forget those "glorious" days before the Six Day War. All over the world good people demonstrated for Israel. One can almost picture the left's reaction to the death of Israel: neverending sympathy rallies, leftists wearing the Star of David on black armbands. Israel could have come to represent the fight for freedom, the struggle to exist. Her people, driven to the sea, could have been martyrs. It would have been beautiful. But Israel won the war and in so doing she lost her "friends." Because she survived, she shall be punished.

But that is not the issue; the absurdity of the left's anti-Israel position can be taken up on another day. The issue is one of Jewish pride. All those Jewish students who whisper the word "Jew" and lower their heads when a Philip Roth story is discussed in a literature course, the Mark Rudds who are prepared to die for the Vietnamese, the Biafrans, the Greeks, and the Czechs, yet who reject Israel - these are our Uncle Toms (let's call them "Uncle Jakes") and our shame. The Jew must accept his identity, he's not just another white man. It's time he realizes he is a Jew, and he'd better accept it. Many Jews are quick to criticize blacks for being impolite enough to call us Jews in public. But that is what we are. From Hillel Club to the New Left is a short jump. And the inevitable jump back, by the Jewish Tom, is even shorter. A man who cannot accept his own identity is a hypocrite and a liar when he pretends to accept someone else's.

And thus from this point on, I shall join no movement that does not accept and support my peoples' struggle. If I must choose between the Jewish cause and a "progressive" anti-Israel SDS, I shall choose the Jewish cause. If the barricades are erected, I will fight as a Jew. Not arbitrarily, not in support of the UFT, but in support of myself. In the final analysis, Mark Rudd and Albert Shanker will be on the same side that's the lesson for the last 30 years. It will be learned.

It has been written that after "the death camps, we retain but one supreme value: to exist." Masada will not fall again.

There is still time, but the burden of proof is not on the Jewish nationalist, but it is on you. You who reject your identity and do not realize that it follows you wherever you go. You who are so trapped in your Long Island split level childhood that you can't see straight. You who fight everything you are - and against the one element that gave you vour damn social consciousness: your Jewish social idealism. In the aftermath of the crematoriums, you are flippant. After Auschwitz, you are embarrassed. Thirty years after the Holocaust, you have learned nothing and forgotten everything. Ghetto Jew, you'd better do some fast thinking.

It is a country where every human being is a soldier, and every soldier is a human being.

The gentlemen who run these tours ran the Yeshiva University tours for many years. I consider them some of the finest men in Jewish life for both efficiency and genuine content. I am sure that these tours will be both enjoyable and Jewishly exciting and enriching.

I certainly do not get a commission on any of these recommendations. A Dramatic Event

I was among those present at the Memorial Service and Protest meeting for Iraqi Jewry at Kehilat Jeshurun Synagogue, on Monday Evening, February 3, 1969.

It appeared as if those assembled in the Synagogue and the thousands gathered outside in the streets, were united and in one voice — let it be known to the world, that this barbaric deed shall never happen again, not only to the Jews in Iraq, but everywhere, wherever they may be.

The services inside the Synagogue were carried by loud-speaker to those outside. It included the responsive reading of the Psalms in Hebrew and English, the Kaddish and Chanting of the Kel Mole Rachamim by Cantor Cohen. Since Kehilat Jeshurun was the host synagogue, *Rabbi Haskel Lookstein* conducted the service. Several other leading Rabbis addressed the audience and eulogized the victims. Included in the program was an unforgettable statement by the brother of one of the martyred Iraqi Jews, who mentioned that "all his brother was guilty of" was being an Iraqi first and a Jew second. Needless to say, there was hardly a dry eye among the vast gathering.

The entire assemblage then filed out to join the thousands who were gathered in the streets, to march on to the Iraqi Mission to the U.N. This was done in a very orderly fashion, along a designated route, down Park Avenue to Fifth Avenue and then on to 79th Street.

What I saw for blocks was a vast sea of humanity including young and old, chanting loudly "Let my People go!" There were many placards and signs, that were carried aloft in the crowd, but one I shall never forget. It was handdrawn by a teen-age girl. How dramatic it was — without any words written on it. On the sign was a blue Mogen David, hung in a Red noose!

Thank the good Lord for our Jewish Youth. They are our future leaders, in the generations to come. We depend on them — and we may well be very proud of them, who like our own dedicated, dynamic spiritual leader *Rabbi Steven Riskin*, will show the Christian world that Israel is a nation among nations and shall so remain.
