From The Rabbi's Desk

The progressively violent revolutions on campuses throughout the country are causing consternation and dismay, shock and fear. Our Public Educational System, formerly the pride of American democracy, is erupting into a hotbed of controversy and strife. Undoubtedly the violent tactics used by black militants and white S.D.S.nicks must be deplored and punished. Professors cannot be physically assaulted, library books cannot be wantonly destroyed, with impunity. However, it is necessary that we attempt to understand the underlying causes of the student unrest so that even as we condemn the offenders we might enact legitimate reforms. Morever, the message of the student rebels might well be fraught with significance not only for the broader University community but also for the specific American Jewish community.

First and foremost, the Campus Revolution is an inextricable part of the Black Revolution. The blacks are bitterly disappointed in the White Power Structure, which is creating a Great Society for almost all but the ghetto black. More significantly, the blacks have been frustrated by the Public School System, which speaks to the largest common denominator of America

> (WASP) in terms which this majority finds understandable and acceptable. As a result, the blacks have not been taught to appreciate their particular culture and heritage; in truth, they have learned to despise it. James Baldwin stated that the greatest evil perpetrated by the whites against the blacks is that the latter have come to believe the canards which the former say about them. In

SHAVUOT LAW AND LORE

Tikun Leil Shavuot — Study for the perfection of the soul during the first night of Shavuot. Every holiday has a special object as the symbol of its observance — Passover *matzot*, Sukkot *Etrog* and Chanukah *menorah*. Shavuot commemorates the giving of the Torah to the Jewish people, and the study of Torah is therefore the only significant Festival symbol. It is a custom to remain awake engrossed in Torah for the entire first night of the holiday to express our dedication to God's law. Shacharit Morning Services are held at the first rays of the new dawn.

Milk Products mark the culinary aspects of Shavuot. According to Jewish tradition, the wicked Holofernes wished to destroy the Jewish community in Israel. The valiant Judith enticed him to her home where she fed him to surfeit with blintzes and milk. As soon as he fell asleep, she severed his head from his body, thus significantly contributing to the Jewish military victory. As we eat our milk products this Shavuot, let us remember our responsibility to our Land "flowing with milk and honey," and do all in our power to protect the homeland of the Jewish people from her many vicious enemies. The future of the Jewish people is inextricably bound up with the future of Medinat Yisrael, and even the Jews of the Diaspora are historic citizens of the Land of Israel. May we never waiver in our commitment, responsibility and dedication.

The Aron Kodesh is bedecked with fragrant flowers to demonstrate our wish to adorn the Torah with nature's beauty.

Holiday Without A Symbol

The one aspect of the upcoming festival of Shavuot that has always fascinated me is its conspicuous lack of a symbol. On Succot we have the beautiful *lulav* and *etrog*, as well as the Succah itself. On Pesach the matzah is the overriding symbol (ah, the taste still lingers), and there is the magnificent pageantry of the Seder. Upon superficial consideration, the festival of Shavuot seems to take a back seat to the other major festivals, for it lacks their moving ceremonies and inspiring symbols.

The key to the magic of the Shavuot festival may be found in the very purpose of the observance of each of the major festivals — to re-experience a specific significant event in the history of the Jewish people. The event that we re-experience on Shavuot is perhaps the most significant in our history — the revelation of God at Mount Sinai and the giving of His Torah to the Jewish people. Yet the Torah has not seen fit to give us a symbol with which to celebrate this world-shattering event.

The answer to this perplexing problem lies in that activity which it has become customary to pursue on the first night of Shavuot. The custom (and it is being enthusiastically carried on at Lincoln Square Synagogue) to remain awake all night immersed in the study of the Torah. It is by this prolonged, sincere, and committed study of the Torah that we re-experience that moment at Mount Sinai, for the very purpose of the giving of the Torah was that it be studied, deeply and with commitment. Just as the matzah on Pesach helps us remember our slavery and appreciate our freedom, and just as the succah on Succot causes us to recall God's providence in the wilderness, so may the study of Torah on Shavuot let us re-live the experience at Mount Sinai when we received God's plan by which to guide our lives.

addition to this, the WASP majority has not been able or willing to assimiliate the black and accept him into its cultural majority. As a result, the black feels comfortable neither within his own racial community nor within the white majority. He is alienated both from his black heritage as well as from White America. He, therefore, preaches Black Power, and agitates for Afro-American studies and racial separatism in an agonized attempt to recapture his roots and appreciate his identity.

As knowledgeable Jews, the Black message should hardly be new to us. The concept of the Chosen People, albeit chosen for responsibility rather than for privilege, has been our strongest defense against Gentile Anti-Semitism. Am Segulah, and the moral and intellectual excellence which it implies, has been our brand of Jewish Power. And, at least beginning with the second quarter of the Twentieth Century, Orthodox leadership has understood the weakness of a "Public School — Melting Pot" educational system. The very equality inherent in the Public School System must serve to teach a unifying life-style tailored to majority practice, a life-style naturally devoid of Sabbath and Festival, Talmud and Israel. The Jew who "makes it" within the educational structure will usually lose his strong Jewish identity and commitment in the process. The Jewish version of Afro-American studies has been the Afternoon Hebrew School and — much more successfully — the Day Schools, which provide intensive Jewish education from Nursery through College. The alienation of Jews like Portnoy and Herzog — uncertain of their relationship to their Jewish past and not yet completely comfortable in or totally accepted by the WASP majority, is not unlike the feelings movingly described by Malcolm X and Eldridge Cleaver before their "conversion" to Black Power. Perhaps the Jewish liberals would do well to listen with their ears to what their mouths are saying. The time has come to reevaluate the Yeshiva system in America and agitate for more Jewish studies on campus. Perhaps our melting-pot image might turn into a symphony image, with each artist playing his own instrument to the best of his ability. A pluralistic equality of opportunity rather than of study material and activity, a unity in diversity, may well be the most viable prescription for the future America.

I believe there is yet another fundamental reason for campus unrest. Our educational system has concentrated on information rather than values, on theoretical exercises in logic rather than relevant guides for living. Especially at a time when the Vietnam conflict has called into question the morality of our politics and the technological advances are dehumanizing our personalities, sensitive individuals are groping for the knowledge which will give direction to a materialistic and confused society. In this regard, higher education has dismally failed. It is no wonder that Herzog and Martha and George ("Who's Afraid of Virginia Wolf") are academic people who have gotten all of their advanced degrees but have not learned to adequately relate to themselves and to others.

Never before have we spoken so frankly about sex and been so unhappy with the experience. From "The Graduate" to Alexander Portnoy, the facts which are being taught are not teaching how to live. The cry for relevance is a cry for meaning, a cry for purpose. Only when learning is reunited with living will our youth be satisfied with their campuses.

From the Jewish perspective, Torah literally means *direction*. Study of Torah is our highest ideal, but only because Torah study will (hopefully) lead to proper actions (Gadol Talmud shemevi liday maaseh). It is the goal of Jewish study to teach man to relate to his God, his family, his neighbor, himself. Theoretical law is linked to applied practice since the abstract discussions of the Talmud, based upon the theological principles of the Bible, form the codes of Jewish law which guide every step of the observant Jew. Insofar as our Torah study remains *Torat Chaim* — a living guide for experience — there will be no riots on the campuses of our Yeshivot.

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AN ARCHAEOLOGIST MAKES A GREAT "FIND"

General Yigal Yadin, Israeli Chief of Staff in 1948 and hero of the War of Independence is now a renowned archaeologist and professor at the Hebrew University. Recently, Professor Yadin discovered a pair of tephilin from the time of the second Temple (about 2,000 years old). He delivered a lecture in Tel Aviv on their historical significance. At the end of his talk, he told of a remarkable experience that happened to him on the train coming from Jerusalem.

On its way to Tel Aviv, the train stopped at the Kfar Chabad station and a number of Lubavitcher hasidim boarded. One of them began inviting the passengers to put on tephilin and fulfill this very important mitzvah.

"When he approached me", said Yadin, "I told him not to bother me as I do not wish to put on tephilin. He pleaded with me and I said that I was not religious and that I don't believe in it. The Lubavitcher persevered. I asked him from where he came and he told me from Russia from where he managed to leave only 2 years ago.

"Tell me" I asked him, "did you put on tephilin in Russia?" He looked at me and said that since he became bar mitzvah he never missed a day. I thought to myself 'Here stands a 38-year-old man born and raised under Communist rule, who never missed putting on tephilin. How can I refuse him'? I was ashamed of myself. Under Russian oppression, Jews sacrifice to put on tephilin and here in the Jewish state, where we have freedom, Yigal Yadin refuses. I put on the tephilin, recited the Shma and prayed, and thanked him for giving me the opportunity. His face shone.


"After I took off the tephilin, an elderly woman came over and said, "The Lubavitcher didn't recognize you, but I know who you are, General Yadin, the archaeologist. Seeing you put on tephilin has given me great pleasure". She then began telling a story. 'My son was also a hasid of Lubavitch. He was the only observant parachutist in his unit. He put on tephilin every day. During the Six Day War, my son was mortally wounded. Lying on the desert sand in critical condition, his buddies asked him, 'What is your last wish?' 'Put on tephilin,' my son barely answered and died. Then and there, all his friends and officers lined up and each in turn put on my dead son's tephilin. Even now, many members of his unit keep his last wish and put on tephilin every day. Now you, General Yadin, have joined them and fulfilled my son's last request".

She took out pictures of her son davening in uniform with his gun and said, "He is dead but his testament lives on. His friends put on tephilin."

"When she showed me the picture of her son, I remembered that I too was carrying pictures which no one had yet seen. In my brief case were photographs of the ancient tephilin that I had discovered.

I was overwhelmed by this chance meeting of the Lubavitcher hasid and the bereaved mother on the train. It was unbelievable and very moving. I felt I would break down.

I took out my pictures and showed them to the mother. She was the first to see my discovery. The elderly woman looked at the pictures and we both began to cry.



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
