

CHANUKKAH

THE FEAST OF DEDICATION
December 18th to 25th

The celebration of Chanukkah commemorates the Jewish victory against the demoralizing and oppressing Syrians and ancient Greeks, who aimed to eradicate Judaism. The revolt was started by the high-priest Mattathias, the Hasmonean, and it continued under his son, the great commander Judas Maccabee. On the 25th of the month of Kislev (164 B.C.E.), three years after the Temple had first been defiled, the brave Jewish soldiers victoriously entered Jerusalem, cleansed, repaired, and re-dedicated the Temple.

They prepared to kindle the perpetual light, but discovered only a small cruse of unpolluted oil, the seal being unbroken, as required. It was believed to be sufficient only for one day's service, but it miraculously lasted eight days, until olives were obtained and fresh oil was made. Therefore the lights are kindled eight days, the number increasing by one daily, from one to eight, in order to magnify the event. Services were joyfully resumed with song and psalms to God, and the celebration continued eight days.

THE OLD COUNTRY - A Review of the Book -

This collection of Sholom
hem's tales is more than a book.
It is the epitaph of a vanished world
and an almost vanished people. The
salty and hilarious folk of whom it
tells - the Jews of Europe - are dead.
All the Tevyas whose souls and sayings,
whose bizarre and tender antics Sholom
Aleichem immortalized in the richest
Yiddish prose ever written, were massacred, six million strong, by the
Germans. And all the quaint and
heartwarming villages in which the
Jews of Europe lived are no longer on
the map.

Sholom Aleichem's capering tales, full of rueful laughter, are not merely the report of a people; they are their historical farewell to a civilization that has wiped them out.

The desperate wit of this great
Yiddish writer animates these tales in
the English translation. That they lack
the import of the original masterpieces
if fault of the translators, Julius
an Frances Butwin. The Butwins have
done an inspired job. The lack is one
which must befall anyone who touches the
genius of Sholom Aleichem and tries to
carry it into another tongue.

For Sholom Aleichem's was the genius of idiom. He and his characters all spoke as if literature had never been invented. They more than spoke, they acted. The words are as full of hidden chuckles, grimaces and meanings as if they were part of a plot - a plot called "Jews" - rather than of a vocabulary. Sholom Aleichem's stories take their place beside the best of Mark Twain, Dickens, Ring Lardner and the translations of Gogol and Gorki.

To say that the pages of "The Old Country" squeeze the heart, even as they stir chuckles and guffaws, is to report tritely but honestly. The hurly-burly of bbis, students, beggars, teachers,

WHY WE DO IT

(A New Feature - Explaining Customs and Ceremonies of Judaism. --- Ed.)

CHANUKAH

The word means Dedication; the name is applied to an 8-day holiday beginning on the 25th of Kislev (December 18th this year).

Known more colloquially as the Feast of Lights, Chanukah commemorates the victory in 165 B.C.E. of the Jews under Judah Maccabeus over the vast army of Antiochus Epiphanes, king of the Syrio-Greeks, who ruled over Palestine. The Jews, called Maccabeesa name derived from the first letters of their slogan "Mi Kamochah Ba-elim), "Who is like unto Adonai" (thee, 0 Lord among the mighty ones?" -succeeding in driving the Syrio-Greeks from the country after overcoming almost insurmountable odds, and proceeded to eradicate every trace of heathen worship from the Holy Temple which the Greeks had defiled and polluted.

Starting on the night of the 24th of Kislev (December 17th after dark) a Menorah or candelabra containing candles or oil is kindled for eight consecutive nights: one candle the first night, two on the second, and so on. The traditional "Mo-oz Tzur" is sung every night after the candles are lighted.

It is customary to give Chanukah Gelt to the children, and a general exchange of gifts between friends and members of the family usually takes place. The eight days of the holiday also constitute a traditional season of gameplaying. This idea originated from the playing of chess. Later on other games were permitted as well, notably Dreidel, a game of put-and-take.

The Dreidel is a four-winged spinning top with the 4 Hebrew letters Nun, Gimel, Hei, Shin -- standing for "Nes Gadol Hayah Shom", "A great miracle happened there" -- engraved thereon. CHANUKAH (continued from page 1)

It was then instituted that every anniversary be likewise observed, he lighting of Chanukah lights, by sor and special holiday psalms (Hallel). In the synagogue an appropriate selection in the Torah is read each day, a part of Numbers 7. On the first night, Tuesday evening, December 17th, one light at the right is kindled, and each successive night another one is added; the additional one is lit first, from left to right until the eighth night.

The faith and confidence that these lights symbolize have enabled the Jewish people to survive many enemies and empires. As we light them, they enlighten us with new hopes of existence, and inspire our efforts.
