

THE FEAST OF PURIM

The story of Purim takes place towards the end of the seventy years of the Babylonion exile (516 B.C.E.), or soil years after, for although the Jews had been given permission to return to Palestine, they still remained under Persian rule.

Purim D'ID celebrates the deliverance of the Jews from extermination by the plot of Haman, Prime Minister of King Ahasuerus of Persia. He chose the 13th day of Adar by casting lots or "pur," from which the name Purim is derived. By the vigilance of Mordecai, who exposed a conspiracy against the king's life, and the intervention of his cousin Esther, the queen, the Jews were saved, and the crafty Haman was hung on his own gallows which he had prepared for Mordecai. The king appointed Mordecai as Prime Minister in Haman's place.

Purim occurs on the 14th of the month of Adar, corresponding this year to Thursday, March 6th. On Wednesday evening and the following morning, the Megillah (Scroll of the Book of Esther), written on parchment is ceremoniously real with traditional intonation in the

synagogue.

Purim is an historical feast, and its message is most characteristic to the Jews as citizens of the world.

THE SPECIAL SABBATHS Preparatory to Passover

There are five. The names of the first four are derived from the additional passages of the Torah read on these Sabbaths.

Sabbath "Shekalim" is the first. It is the one preceding Rosh Chodesh Adar, or coinciding with it. The extra reading refers to the half a shekel that every Israelite, of twenty years of age or over, rich or poor, gave as his equal share toward the support of the Temple. (Ex. 30:11-16.)

Sabbath "Zachor" or "Remember" is the second. It is specifically the one preceding Purim, because Haman was assumed to be a descendant of the Amalekites, the arch enemy of Israel. He and his family were eradicated which is regarded as the fulfillment of the prophecy in the portion read. (Deut. 25:17-19)

Sabbath "Parah" is the third.

Passover was approaching and the time had arrived for the unclean to become ritually clean in order to be permitted to partake of the Passover sacrifice.

The law of purification is contained in the selection from Deut. 19.

Sabbath "Hachodesh" or "The Month" is the fourth. It is the Sabbath before Rosh Chodesh Nisan, or coinciding with it. The additional passage begins with: "This month shall be the head of the months for you." It also contains the law regarding the Passover sacrifice. (Ex. 12:1-20)

THE FAST OF ESTHER

WHY WE DO IT

(A New Feature - Explaining Customs and Ceremonies of Judaism. --- Ed.)

PURIM

Historical Background: During the reign of Ahasuerus (Xerxes) in Persia, 485 to 464 B.C.E.. the Jews enjoyed considerable freedom and privileges. Ahasuerus, a rather foolish king, once became enraged at his wife, Vashti, and deposed her -only to find himself lonesome for a mate. A province-wide beauty contest conducted to find a wife for the king resulted in the selection of Esther, cousin of Mordecai the Jew. Esther's religion is kept secret until such time as she pleads for the rescue of her people who had been doomed for extinction by Haman, Ahasuerus' Prime-Minister, as an act of revenge to Mordecai. Through Esther's intervention, the Jews were saved, and Haman and his family were executed instead on the same gallows and on the same day (the 14th day of Adar) set aside for the Jews' destruction.

Celebration: In token of the thanks the Jewish nation offers to G-d for their salvation, the 13th of Adar -- Wednesday, March 5th this year -- is a day of fasting, known as the Fast of Esther. The following day is a day of rejoicing called Purim (which means Lots, because Haman cast lots to determine the day on which the Jewish nation was to be destroyed).

In the Synagogue: On the night of the 13th of Adar and the morning of the 14th of Adar (March 4th and 5th, respectively), the Megillah -- a scroll containing the complete story of Esther -- is read. The reading is accompanied by varieties of noise-making (the most common device for which is known as the Grager) at every mention of Haman's name.

On Purim, too, an additional prayer is included in the Amidah prayer -- that of Al Hanissim.
