

THE PASSOVER FESTIVAL

Pesach MDD or the Passover Festival is inaugurated at sunset on the 14th of the month of Nisan and it ends in the evening of the 22nd. These dates correspond this year with Friday evening, April 4th, to Saturday evening, April 12th. The first two days and the last two are sacred. It is the first of the three Pilgrimage Festivals.

It was a springtime festival, occurring in the early spring harvest in Palestine. Today its agricultural aspect is again expressed there by outdoor merry-making during "Chol Hamoed," the "semi-holidays" (the intermediate days between the first and second sacred days).

Historically, Passover commemorates the anniversary of the liberation of the Israelites from Egyptian bondage (about 1450 B.C.E.). It is the birthday of the Jewish nation. It is the Festival of Freedom, "Zeman Cherusenu." We are at all times to remember it, hence, it is the central point in many of our prayers. We read in the Haggadah, "In every generation, the Jew should regard himself as though he went forth from Egypt."

PASSOVER CEREMONIES

THE HAGGADAH

The Haggadah or "The Story" is the book that is used at the Seder. It contains the order of the service. It is a compilation of extracts from the Bible, the Talmud, the psalms, the prayer book, and special prayers, and songs.

Altogether it forms a comprehensive account of the stay of the Israelites in Egypt, and their final departure.

MATZOTHS

Why is it called "Chag Hamatzoth," the Feast of Matzoth? Because during it we are commanded to eat only unleavened bread, but neither to eat nor to possess leaven (Chamets). It is the "Bread of Affliction," the "Bread of Poverty," hurriedly made because the Israelites had to depart in haste. Ex. 12:33-41.

THE SEDER

The Passover Festival is principally a home celebration. The first two evenings, known as "Seder evenings," serving as a great occasion for family reunion. Besides the matzoths and the cups of wine, other articles of food symbolic of the slavery and freedom of the Israelites occupy the festive table.

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EDITORIAL

The experiences of our forefairs in ancient Egypt and their final liberation from slavery symbolizes most of all the ideal of Freedom.

To the Jew, freedom has always been subordinated to the higher ideal of spiritual freedom; the freedom of the soul and of the mind; the freedom of religion. For sheer survival, he had to fall back upon his spiritual resources. The strength that he found in his traditions, in his religion, and in his faith in G-d, helped him to overcome adversity and travail.

Today, we are a ravished people. We are 6,000,000 less than we were ten years ago. If we are to survive, we must strengthen our resolves to destroy the tyrant, wherever and whenever he may arise.

"In every generation", the Haggadah tells us, peoples and nations arise to destroy us, but "G-d succors and saves us".

As we sit at our Seder table and celebrate the festive season, let us be worthy of the faith of our stricken brethren wherever they may be. Let Passover forever symbolize for us true spiritual freedom.

PASSOVER CEREMONIES (Continued) THE FOUR CUPS

The four cups of wine represent the four synonymous expressions of redemption, namely: "I will bring you out," "deliver you," "redeem you," "take you." (Ex. 6:6, 7).

CUP OF ELIJAH

A mysterious ceremony at the Seder concerns the "Cup of Elijah," who in tradition is welcomed as the heralder of good tidings and redemption for Israel. In a spirit of hospitality, therefore, the cup is prepared for him. "He shall turn the heart of the fathers by he children, and the heart of the children by their fathers." From this comes the motto of Young Israel "השיב לב אבות על בנים על אבותם",

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A MESSAGE FROM RABBI H.D. SILVER

The Hagodah speaks of four sons of different dispositions - the wise, the wicked, the simple, and the indifferent. These symbolize Jewish national character in the Diaspora.

From the Jewish communities in Babylon then Spain, France and the pre-Mendelsohn era in Germany came many wise sons. In that period, Israel was absorbed in the Torah and its interpretation.

After Mendelsohn, the wicked son dominated. In assimilation he sought to throw off the yoke of the Torah. Then followed the era of the Hassidison - the simple son, clinging to Jewish tradition as life itself.

Alas, to the American Jew, falls the lot of the fourth son - indifferent to his background. Educate the indifferent and ignorant son, advises the Hagodah. To perpetuate our identity as a people, we must heed this call. We must be ever young in reaching for our high goal - education.

Young Israel has set a pattern by offering a refresher course in Jewish living. The need has been reorganized through its Institute of Jewish studies and other educational endeavors in its various branches.

In celebrating the exodus from Egypt our hearts should go back to Mt. Sinai so that we may be worthy of our redemption.

PASSOVER CEREMONIES (Cont'd)

The institution of Maoth Chitim or Money for Matzoths is time-honored is described in the Jewish Codes of Law. A Jew cannot sit down at his Seder table to enjoy the Passover Festival unless he has previously arranged that those less fortunate than he shall have their Passover necessities.

PASSOVER FESTIVAL (Continued)

The festival is known as Passover because God passed over the houses of the Israelites in Egypt when he smote the first-born of the Egyptians, but spared the houses of the Israelites.
