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The Significance of Purim

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PRESIDENT'S CORNER

The great outpouring of Orthodox Jews protesting the slaughter of nine Jews in Baghdad, both at the rally sponsored by the National Council of Young Israel at the United Nations and the mass demonstration at the Iraqi embassy on the following week brought home most forcefully the effective role that Orthodox Jews are beginning to play in American political life. Orthodox Jewry is surely showing evidence of climbing out of the shadows of passiveness into the sunlight of active participation in the mainstream of American life.

We are now making our voices heard in the legislative halls of our states whether it be on the subject of shechita or the civil rights of Sabbath observers. We have become the vanguard of militants seeking to attain equal rights from public officials who have attempted to make their own ethnic groups their only bailiwick. In this we are upholding an old American custom of peaceful assembly for the redress of wrongs.

More and more we are becoming recognized as a group whose faith in the Lord and practice in traditional mitzvot make us completely compatible with the best of American democratic values. We are overcoming the suspicions of Americans — gentiles as well as many "liberal" Jews — that we are a clan interested only in our own immediate welfare.

The formation of the Public Affairs Committee of the National Council is testimony to our newly awakened interest in the secular. The tremendous growth of Yeshiva University and junior yeshivos and day schools with their equal emphasis of religious and secular studies are positive indications of our progress in modern education.

On all fronts Orthodox Jewry is moving ahead to claim its rightful place in American Jewry. It does not, nor should it, claim to speak for Conservative or Reform Jews. But by taking the lead in secular affairs it can prove itself to be a dynamic rather than a moribund force. It will thus continue to carry on the great traditions of countless generations who gave of their best for the advancement of every country of which they were citizens.

PURIM LAWS AND CUSTOMS

According to Hebrew reckoning, Purim occurs on the 14th day of Adar, corresponding to March 4th of this year.

"Purim" is the Hebrew term which means "Casting of Lots". The holiday, per se, lasts only one day, and all necessary labor is permitted on that day.

There is much feasting and merrymaking associated with Purim. Appetites are enhanced by observing the fast day of Ta'anis Esther, which occurs the day before Purim, March 3rd. Ta'anis Esther was the day appointed by Haman for the execution of his edict against the Jews. On this day also, Esther and all the Jews of the Persian realm fasted and prayed to G-d for deliverance. The noise-making comes in mostly during the reading of the Megillah, at every mention of Haman's name, and is produced mainly by use of the "gragger" and the stamping of the feet.

On the Sabbath prior to Purim we read the Portion "Zachor" for Maftir, relating Israel's war with Amalek and reminding us not to forget the evil which Amalek did to us following our Exodus from Egypt. This portion reveals to us that in every generation there is a struggle between good and evil.

The Megillah is read on Purim night, Monday, March 3rd, and all (including mourners) are obligated to read it. The Megillah is read in a traditional tune following the recitation of three blessings — (a) enjoining us to read the Megillah; (b) "Who wrought miracles for our fathers in those days at this season"; (c) "Shehechianu". The ten chapters of the Megillah contain the following:

- 1-The demise of Vashti
- 2-Enthroning of Esther
- 3—Haman's evil design
- 4-Mordecai's appeal to Esther

- 5-Esther approaches the king
- 6-The king honors Mordecai
- 7-Esther pleads for her people
- 8—Esther's request is granted
- 9—The Jews destroy their enemies, and the Purim Feast
- 10-The greatness of Mordecai.

Before the reading, three half-dollars (Shekalim) are customarily donated to the poor, and after the reading we say special prayers-"Shoshanas Ya'Akov", "Yariv Es Rivenue", etc. During the Amida of the evening, morning and afternoon services and also during the Birchas Hamazon (Grace) we include the "Al Hanisim" passages in our prayers. The famous Purim Seudah (feast) commences before sundown on the 14th of Adar. We celebrate our deliverance from the wicked designs of Haman rather than our revenge on our enemies. The feast continues far into the night. The 14th and 15th of Adar are given over strictly to rejoicing. Since the Jews of Persia celebrated Purim on the 15th of Adar, this day is called Shushan Purim.

Shalach Manos (Sending of Gifts) is practiced on Purim and Shushan Purim. These gifts are mandatory, not voluntary. Every individual must give a present to two poor people (one present to each). It is also necessary to give at least two presents to one person, and these usually consist of portions of food.

It is interesting to note the comment of our sages to the effect that in time to come when all other standard holidays are abolished, Purim alone will be retained. According to Maimonides only two sacred books will be remembered in the days of the Messiah: the Pentateuch and the Megillah.
