PRESIDENT'S CORNER

It is an ironic twist of fate that the clock of history should revert itself to an era of thirty-five hundred years ago. Then, as now, the adversaries were the Jews and Egyptians. Then, as now, the Lord worked a miracle and the Jews triumphed over Egypt. Having vanquished the foe then, the Israelites were faced by new enemies—the Edomites, Canaanites, Philistines, and other hostile nations on the road to the Promised Land.

Israel, on its present journey to a peaceful existence, is likewise faced by foes that seem bent on its destruction. Unlike the foes of ancient times who fought with arms, today's enemies use backroom diplomacy, blackmail and threats. Their domiciles include such institutions as those devoted — at least by word if not by deed — to the cause of peace. But their goals are the same as those of the nations of yesteryear — the complete destruction of the Jewish State.

Yet we must face the truth by saying that Israel may suffer defeat not only by what its enemies do, but what its friends do not do. And by "friends" we mean our Jews in this land. Israel desperately needs our moral and financial support now. It needs every American Jew to campaign vigorously for support by the Government in Washington not only on paper, but in deeds. This means letter writing, joining demonstrations and physically visiting the proper authorities when necessary. It means contributing to such campaigns as the United Jewish Appeal, the Jewish National Fund, and the Red Mogen David, It means buying Israeli made products (and the number of items available grows daily). It means investing in Israel's future through the purchase of Israel Bonds.

Passover has always been identified with freedom. In our time we must do all we can to insure Israel's freedom from harassment, evil diplomacy and physical danger. Each of us, in our own way, can be a little Moses leading Israel to the Promised Land. As we retell the story of the Exodus at our Seder tables this year, let us resolve that we shall work during the coming year with all the strength the Lord has given us to see that true freedom comes to Israel.

WARNING (AZORAH)!

There is NO bakery in our borough of The Bronx that bakes properly supervised Kosher cakes, cookies or macaroons for Passover for retail consumption. One should obtain packaged products baked under approved rabbinic supervision, or call the synagogue office, where information concerning the Kosher bakeries in New York City will be given.

TO THOSE WHO HAVE PETS

Chometz is not permitted in one's possession during the entire Passover! Check the diet of your pets and substitute all Chometz with other Passover foods. Bird food is Chometz and we have been advised by Hartz Mountain Foods that Matzoh Farfel, ground up and spread out, is an ample substitute in the bird's diet for the Passover week.

CONCERNING FOWL FOR PASSOVER

All chickens and fowl should be purchased and Koshered before the advent of the yom tov. Do not purchase fowl during Chol Hamoed (Intermediate Days). If you are short of freezer space, have your butcher store it for you until you are ready to use it.

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PASSOVER GUIDE

Passover begins at sunset of the 14th day of the Jewish calendar month of Nisan. The festival lasts for 8 days. The first two days and the last two days are full holidays. The intervening four days are Chol Hamoed, half holidays.

Foods Forbidden on Passover

Any food or drink made from wheat, rye, barley, oats, corn and other grains or their derivatives are subject to the laws of Chometz. Therefore, such products as pickles, horseradish, etc. have to be made under special supervision for Passover as they may contain grain vinegar or other forbidden spices.

Foods such as matzohs, cakes, macaroons, candy, soft drinks, wines, liquors, milk, canned food and dried fruits require supervision, attested by recognized Rabbinical authority. Do not be misled by irresponsible merchants who due to chaotic conditions in American Jewish life, take advantage of a gullible public by indiscriminately pasting "Kosher L'-Pesach" labels on articles which are really chometzdik and are forbidden. All green vegetables may be used except rice, millet, peas and beans.

Children should not be fed Chometz during Passover unless a physician has so advised and after the Rabbi has been consulted as to the procedure. We are happy to note that there is now available Kosher for Passover baby food and cereals from several reliable manufacturers.

Sale of Chometz (Mechiras Chometz)

As we are forbidden to have Chometz in our possession during Passover, the Rabbi is usually authorized to draw up a bill of sale and negotiate transfer of Chometz to a non-Jew. The transaction for selling Chometz is a completely legal one giving the non-Jew all rights of ownership over the Chometz sold to him. After the festival the Rabbi repurchases the Chometz from the non-Jew. Any contributions will be given over to worthy charities.

The Search for Chometz

The ceremony of the symbolic official search for leavened bread takes place after sunset on the 13th day of Nisan.

The head of the family, equipped with a lighted candle, goes from room to room gathering little crumbs of bread as a symbolic expression that the house has been cleansed of all Chometz and is ready for the Passover Festival. The Chometz thus gathered is burned the following morning.

Fast of the First Born

Because the first born of the Israelites were spared when the Egyptians were smitten in the tenth plague, all first born Jewish males fast on Erev Pesach until the Seder. If, however, one attends Seudat Mitzvah (a feast of religious duty) one is not required to fast. It is, therefore, customary in all synagogues that a Siyum (conclusion of a Talmudic tractate) follows the morning service on the Eve of Passover.

Dishes and Utensils

The Laws of Kashering are many and varied and dependent upon time. Our Rabbi should be consulted sufficiently before Passover for all details. It is best to have separate sets of Passover utensils to avoid any question or doubt.

The Seder Symbols

1. The Three Matzohs — Yachatz:— The middle matzoh is broken and the larger piece taken for the afikomen, which is eaten at the end of the meal to commemorate the paschal lamb. After eating the afikomen it is forbidden to eat anything more for the rest of the night. Motzi — When making the "Motzi" (Blessing—Hamotzi Lechem Min Ho'oretz), and the Blessing, Al Achilas Matzo, all the matzos including the broken one in the middle are held, but then the third one is put down and the top whole one and middle half one is broken and at least a piece the size of an olive should be eaten. It has been said by our commentaries that the reason a broken matzoh is used is to indicate the "Lechem Oni," the bread of the afflicted. And as a poor man eats broken pieces so do we show, on this night, that we join with him.

2. *Morror* — The bottom matzoh is used later with the morror sandwich, the bitter herbs which are a remembrance of the bitterness suffered by our forefathers in Egypt. When we eat the morror it is dipped into Charoses.

3. *Charoses* — Represents the mortar and clay that went into the making of the bricks for Pharaoh. When dipping the Moror into the Charoses, we should not take so much Charoses on, that it will reduce completely the tastc of the bitterness.

4. Karpas — Basically parsley, but may be any vegetable such as onion, tomato, potato, etc., which is dipped into salt water (which is said to commemorate the tears of our forefathers) and the blessing of "Borei Pri Hoadomah," is recited.

5. Z'roa — the symbol of the Paschal lamb, which is a meat bone with some flesh on it roasted on the fire. When roasting this bone one should not say, "this is the Paschal lamb," because we are not permitted to imitate the Korban Pesach (the paschal sacrifice). Since the destruction of the Temple, the most we are permitted, are the symbols. For that reason it is not permitted to eat roasted meats or chicken at the Seder. Pot roasted (that is in water) is permitted.

6. Betzah — a boiled egg which is roasted on the fire, is the symbol of the Korban Hagigah, the festival sacrifice in the Temple. It is said that eggs symbolize mourning, and the reminder of the destruction of the Temple on the Seder night makes us sorrowful. For that reason, it is customary that eggs and salt water are eaten on the Seder night.

7. The Four Cups of Wine — which we drink at the Seder is a MUST, incumbent upon EVERYONE. At least the majority of each cup must be consumed even by women. Grape Juice (made under Rabbinical supervision) is acceptable as wine. The four cups symbolize the four expressions of redemption used in the Torah — "I will bring you forth, I will rid you of bondage, I will redeem you, and I will take you to me for a people." (Exodus VI - 7). Because of the disagreement amongst the Sages, whether or not the expression in the next sentence (Exodus VI - 8) "And I will bring you unto the land" is another expression of redemption which would necessitate a fifth cup, we resolve the matter by making the fifth cup for Elijah the prophet, the one who will bring the news of the future redemption.

Our Annual Dinner in honor of Sol and Fay Spitz held Feb. 15th at the Concourse Plaza Hotel was the largest in the history of our congregation. The food and service were superb, the music excellent and the program short and to the point. The Journal published under the chairmanship of Max Spielberger was the largest and helped make the affair a financial success. Accolades to Lou Rifkin, dinner chairman, and his committee and Julius Horowitz, toastmaster for the evening.

The Torah Dinner held on March 8th marking the Siyum of. the Talmudic tractate Shabbas was a true demonstration for Torah learning. The toastmaster for the evening, Stanley M. Langer, pointed out that Torah learning is the very basis of Judaism and through our Adult Education program we can build Yiddishkeit. Greetings were given by Rabbis Gershon Romanoff, Zevulon Charlof on behalf of the National Council. and the presidents of our various synagogue organizations. Rabbi George B. Schwartz of Young Israel of Boro Park, older brother of our rabbi, spoke at the dinner in Levin Hall. Cantor David Werdyger, accompanied by Vladimir Heifitz entertained. John Greenfield did a magnificent job as dinner chairman and our thanks to him for his good work.
