

A favorite cliché, which has become polarized into our contemporary society, is the expression "the generation gap." We rationalize the behavior of our off-spring and explain his weird dress, his fantastic hairdo and his bewhiskered image by a shake of the head and a derisive allusion to his lack of maturity. His standards of social behavior, and his freedom from the normal inhibitions are incomprehensible to us. This seeming misunderstanding between father and son tends to divide the two, with the chasm deepening as time lengthens.

Are we, then, willing to accept this phenomenon as a fact of life? Are we ready to divest ourselves of the responsibility which we voluntarily assumed? If we feel that the path of our young ones leads only to anguish and frustration, what is our recourse? Perhaps it is we who are at fault. Perhaps we are the ones who have deviated from the norm. Perhaps our behavior is incongruous and confusing and incompatible. Perhaps youth fails to relate to us because we fail to relate to a principle, to a belief that is wholesome and noble and spiritual.

Are we not guilty of greed and avarice? Are we not guilty of seeking physical pleasures and loose moral values? Can we truly say our standards are always honorable?

The old axiom is as true today as it was a century ago "The apple falls not far from the tree." And in Young Israel of Parkchester I see it exemplified every day, and I marvel at it, for to me it spells out hope that others too, seeing it are influenced by it. I refer to the father - son relationships amongst our congregants. I'm privileged to witness the product of example, and the pride and the warmth that results. I see an honest sincerity and a strong bond that has been built between father and son. Because the father has instilled in his son a belief, a sense of belonging, a tie, a faith, a foundation. And he has done that by example.

FROM THE MEN'S CLUB

My wife and I recently returned from a trip to Israel and I would like to share our impressions of the State of Israel with the members of the Men's Club. This was our first visit to Israel and throughout our travels from North to South and East to West we were overwhelmed by the beauty of the land, the green scenery and the colorful flowers.

We also noticed that there is prosperity in the Land. People are earning good salaries, the stores are packed with merchandise and customers. There is a shortage of labor and the Government is actually bringing in Arab labor from the occupied territories. There is much construction of private homes and apartment houses all over the land, but more so in Jerusalem.

One of the most important industries is tourism and everything is being done to keep the tourists happy. The hotels are beautiful, food is good and plentiful, tour buses are air conditioned and the guides are very knowledgeable and accommodating.

A word about safety in the streets — for the first time in many years and thousands of miles away from our home in The Bronx, we were able to venture out into the streets at any time of day or night without any fear of returning to our hotel safely — what a grand feeling!

One of the highlights of the trip was our four visits to the Western Wall. I could not help myself, but each time my eyes filled up with tears - happy tears. While I was praying there I reminded myself of reading in our history books THAT IN 1898 OUR GREAT LEADER AND CREATOR OF THE WORLD ZIONIST ORGANIZATION. DR. THEODORE HERZL, STOOD AT THE WALL AND TEARS ROLLED DOWN HIS CHEEKS, ALSO, THAT ON PASSOVER IN 1928 OUR GREAT ZIONIST MENACHEM LEADER, USISHKIN, COMFORTED THE PEO-PLE WHO GATHERED AT WALL TELLING THEM THAT UP TILL NOW THE STONES OF THE WALL WERE THE LAST STONES

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ON THE OBSERVANCE OF CHANUKAH

Chanukah, which in Hebrew means Dedication, is the Festival of Lights celebrated annually for eight days, from the 25th day of Kislev (this year, Tuesday Evc., December 22nd through Wednesday, December 30th).

Every evening in the Synagogue and at home, the Chanukah lights are lit. Though it is permissible to light the Chanukah candles before nightfall, they should be large enough or the Chanukah lamp should contain enough oil, to burn one half hour from the time of nightfall. On Friday evening, when the Chanukah lights are lit earlier than on weekdays, special care should be taken to use large enough candles to burn one half hour after nightfall.

The sole object of the kindling of the Chanukah lights is not the illumination of the house within, but that passersby should see them and recall the miracle of Chanukah. Therefore, they should be placed near a window. If one lives too high for the people in the street to see his Chanukah lamp, it should be placed on a chair or on a stand near the left side of one of the doors in the house, opposite the Mezuzah.

The order of lighting the Chanukah lights is as follows:

On the first evening of Chanukah one candle is lit; on the second night, two candles; on the third, three, and so, one more is added each evening until the eighth, when all the candles are lit.

On the first night, the candle to be lit is placed on the right end of the Chanukah lamp. On the second night, one is added next to the first from right to left and every evening, the candle added is from right to left. The newly added candle is lit first and then the lighting of the other candles is continued towards the right.
