Chanukah Reminders

The holiday of Chanukah is fast approaching, as we will kindle the first light Sunday evening, December 12th. Here are several reminders for proper observance: Chanukah candles must burn at least one half hour after sundown.

The newly added light each night is the first to be kindled.

All members of the family should participate in the kindling of Chanukah lights and join in the singing of the Chanukah chant.

On Friday, December 17th, the Chanukah candles must be lit before 4:10 P.M. It has become customary to indulge in games, riddles and other past-times, especially "drevdlach" on Chanukah evenings.

"Chanukah Gelt" is a tradition children never forget. It is almost obligatory for parents and relatives to distribute money or gifts to children on Chanukah.

Chanukah gelt should also be distributed to help the poor, the sick and various worthy causes, especially Torah Institutions.

Latkes (potato pancakes) is a special Chanukah dish.

A Lovable Character

Personable, aggressive, autocratic these are just some of the adjectives describing our newly-elected president. Sid Sussman is all of these, and more, as once more he is called upon to guide the destiny of Young Israel of Parkchester. Elected by acclamation, Sid dominates every meeting he attends, whether or not he presides over it. Sid Sussman is unique in this role, for despite his insistence on having the last word, and of having his will prevail, you are made to feel that it was you who were the chief architect and the engineer of the idea - the plan - the modus operandi.

While at first you may be inclined to take exception to his reception of your suggestion, and to his curt dismissal of what you thought was a logical, sequential program, you soon begin to see the weaknesses and the flaws as he tears into your schematic, piece by piece. In amazement, you realize how well the man must have done his homework. Bring up any subject directly related to synagogue activities, and he immediately throws facts and figures at you, plus the

How can you be long disturbed by an individual who tells you very plainly that you are wrong, but in so doing the sting and the barb are both removed? While outwardly he may be rough and gruff in his approach, his manner is so disarming as to suggest that trace of ubbicence which serves to remove the possibility of offense. He may try to convey the impression of being dictatorial, but as a martinet he is a delightful fraud. His guidance is often mistaken for interference, but once he is satisfied that you are fulfilling your responsibilities as chairman, seldom will he question or probe. He may be quick to criticize and yet unstinting in his praise. He is a dynamo of work, and never asks you to do a chore that he is not ready and willing to do himself. He is ever alert to efforts and projects fruitful to the synagogue. Conversely, when you are less than productive, he is not backward to let you know that he knows it.

Sid boasts about the esprit, the spirit, the soul of the shul. He goes into ecstasy about the "boys in the synagogue," how friendly they are, their warmth in their welcome to strangers, how eager they are to extend a helping hand to the newcomer, and how positive is their response where you but show a desire, a willingness to pitch in to do the many tasks a synagogue must have done.

The strength of any organization is in its nucleus. The heart and core of Young Israel of Parkchester are those who willingly shoulder the burden so as to make our synagogue a viable, living, and humane community center. In his zeal to help the shul project this image, Sidney's example has sparked the flame that lights the path to the doors of our synagogue.

As long as there are Sidneys, there will always be Yiddishkeit!
