The Exodus From Faith

As we approach our traditional holidays we feel the stirring within us of anticipation and gratification. Somehow the world seems brighter, our mood is lighter; we seem to reflect more togetherness and more warmth. The fact that we have roots in our community, and that we have a common home where we may congregate, makes possible a life that is more enriched and more meaningful. Satisfaction, contentment

and an untroubled mind come from living a "whole" life. We need spiritual fulfillment to make our lives complete. The wholesomeness of a full life radiates that sense of peace that sinks into the soul.

Because of thoughts such as these, I find difficulty in following the logic of our contemporaries who are retiring into condominiums. In our travels this summer, we visited many of our friends who have given up their lives here, for condominium living in Florida. Their search is for a new life, a Shangri-la; but instead they find themselves retiring from the mainstream of normal living. There is no panacea and there is no Shangri-la. Normal living may not be found in a faraway land away from the everyday problems that man is heir to. Our lives are geared to coping with our anxieties, cancelling them out, deriving satisfaction from solving each of them, and looking forward to tomorrow. We can all look forward to successful retirements with benefits undreamed of, if only we are not panicked into hasty decisions.

Condominium living is not the answer. We very carefully observed this type of communal living. We watched this "carefree" living, this life of easy retirement so prevalent amongst the hundreds upon hundreds of condominium villages spread over Southern Florida. We found every day to be Sunday there; from the moment you have your breakfast to slumber time to strive at "pleasures" so that time will be consumed till the next day. You must go swimming, you must play shuffleboard, you must golf and play cards and you must wait your turn at the ping pong tables. And of course you must go shopping (this chore is being taken over by the men), for it means time is being consumed.

And what is most disturbing is to find that you have lost your religion. Condominiums do not permit a house of worship within their walls. Condominiums generally are situated in isolated areas. Obstacles arise in trying to build on adjacent property. You find apathy on the part of your neighbors. It means money which they don't have,

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

The Jewish Calendar: The calendar we use in our daily activity is solar, based upon the movement of the earth around the sun. The Jewish calendar (luach) is both solar and lunar, and is based upon the revolutions of the moon around the earth. As the moon takes $29\frac{1}{2}$ days to travel around the earth, the Jewish year has twelve months of 29 or 30 days each, 354 days in all. In order to bring the calendar in line with the solar year, a leap month is added 7 times every 19 years.

In olden days, there was no fixed calendar in Palestine. Each month was proclaimed when the new moon was seen by two witnesses who reported it to the Sanhedrin, the supreme Jewish court. Inasmuch as communities outside of Palestine received the information about the new moon very late, all the festivals were celebrated for two days instead of one. In Palestine itself only one day was observed, except for Rosh Hashono, which was celebrated for two days everywhere.

Yo-mim no-ro-im: The High Holy Days are known as Yomim Noroim, or awe-inspiring days. This description comes from the solemn nature of both Rosh Hashono and Yom Kippur.

Aseres y'me T'shuvo: The ten-day period beginning with Rosh Hashono and ending with Yom Kippur is called Aseres y'me T'shuvo, the ten days of penitence. Traditionally, Jews went to persons they had harmed and begged forgiveness during this period.

Shabos Shuvo: The Sabbath between Rosh Hashono and Yom Kippur is known as Shabbos Shuvo, the Sabbath of Return. Its name is taken from the Haftoro read on that Sabbath, which begins "Shuvo Yisroel," "Return O Israel unto the Lord thy God." (Hosea 14:2ff.)

Memorial Light: On Yom Kippur eve a memorial light, to burn for 24 hours, may be kindled in the home to recall departed loved ones.

Kaporos: It is customary to give a donation to charity on the day before Yom Kippur. The offering is called Kaporos and is reminiscent of the offering of a sacrifice in the ancient Temple on that day.

The Shofor: The Shofor is made from the horn of a ram. It is blown at the morning service on Rosh Hashono and at the end of N'ilo, the closing service on Yom Kippur. The great Jewish Philosopher, Saadia Gaon, gave ten reasons for blowing the shofor. Among them were:

1. To proclaim the sovereignty of God on the anniversary of the creation of the world. (According to tradition, God created the world on Rosh Hashono.)
2. To stir man to repentance.
3. To remind us of the message of the prophets.
4. To remind us of Abraham's willingness to sacrifice Isaac, which legend holds took place on Rosh Hashono. Instead of Isaac, Abraham eventually sacrificed a ram, according to the Bible.

Fasting: In ordaining Yom Kippur, the Bible says: "Ye shall afflict your souls." This is the basis of fasting, the abstinence from food and drink on Yom Kippur. The purpose of fasting is to emphasize the spiritual nature of man. Children usually begin to fast as the age of 13.

Kol-Nidre: The eve of Yom Kippur is called Ko lNidre. The inspiring melody chanted at the beginning of the evening service speaks of God's forgiveness of legilious vows unfulfilled through negligence or persecution. Kol Nidre is more inspiring in our day for its fervid melody than for its limited verbal significance.

White Mantle: The Torah and Ark are decorated with white covers during the High Holy Day season. White is the symbol of purity, as we read in Isaiah: "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow."

A New Year's Resolution

Millions of our people heed the call of these awesome and majestic days — a call to self-examination and meditation upon the true meaning of life and its struggles, which leads to stronger faith in G-d and loyalty to His Torah.

Our hearts will thrill as we read the Machzor, realizing as we do that the hallowed prayers for the restoration of "glory to Thy people, hope to those who seek Thee, and confidence to those who yearn for Thee" and for "new joy to Thy land" are on their way to fulfillment.

These events should strengthen our conviction that the Jews and Judaism are as eternal as the earth upon which we live. If we read these signs aright, we will gird ourselves with new resolution to make Judaism a living reality in our lives. Fortifying our homes by the observance of Kashruth, Sabbath and Yom Tov; inculcating in our children a love of Judaism by precept and example and providing them with a maximum Jewish education that will assure the Jewish tomorrow; strengthening our synagogues by using them throughout the year as houses of worship and centers of learning, dispensing charity and supporting Israel — in all these ways, we may bring our lives into tune with this new era and assure our people eternal life.

since it was spent buying the condominium. Frantically, you begin to realize that you allowed yourself to be pulled away from your family, your friends, your life-time habits, and your spiritual comfort. You find yourself trapped and living a life consisting of vacations only.

Hence the danger to Jewish life is real. We seem to be turning our backs to the Shul, to the Synagogue, to our religion. And I wonder whether we mean to do that. We let ourselves be swayed by well-meaning friends who are afraid to transfer to condominiums alone. They want you to be with them. In your great desire to find a "new life" (whatever that may be) you follow blindly, without analyzing what it really is you're getting into. The great danger is that faith and spiritual comfort will be dealt a heavy blow. Condominiums grow at the expense of religion. Condominiums cause one to compromise his religious beliefs, and for many it is too great a sacrifice.

And so, as we worship in this new year, let us give thought to the lives we must lead to perpetuate our Yiddishkeit; to strengthen its ties so as to bind us together. Let us ever be mindful that the family that prays together stays together.
