A Forward Look

Are you with it? Because I'm not, and I don't think you are either.

During the past month we attended three weddings; in each case the "Chusan" and the Bride were in their twenties. Each wedding as well attended; each had its dance music; and each had a plentiful supply of food. But there the similarity ended. Two of them were in the traditional form-fitting "Chusan-Kolla" format, while the third was in the freewheeling liberalized version, composed in an off-Broadway theatrical style, acted out by the two main characters, with never a thought to the spectators. witnesses and audience.

I had never witnessed the new-type wedding, and was not prepared for the events as they unfolded. The bride and groom had requested a hands-off policy from their parents, who were merely just "one of the guests," and who just paid the bill. There was only a sprinkling of relatives. Most of the guests were the friends of the couple. The ceremony was make-shift and not organized. The groom had composed the words to the ritual or ceremony. The Rabbi's part was played down. The whole thing lasted only a few minutes, and will be remembered only because it was uninspiring.

The parents on both sides were just spectators. They did not mingle with one another. The meal was buffet style. There was no table-hopping by the parents or by the bride and groom. I never met the parents of the groom. We just were never introduced. The band was a young group and played dance music only for the young ones. Nothing that we could

dance to. There was none of the gaiety and spontaneity and togetherness. And, of course, there was no group dancing, no waltzes.

On the other hand, the other two weddings were in the traditional style which has existed for scores of years, and which brought nachas and pleasure to every guest. The parents were consulted and played a prominent part, second only to the bride and groom. Each affair was well organized, where the guest was made to feel that he belonged and that he added to the occasion. The parents participated in the ceremony, and as they all stood under the "Chupa," the happiness just radiated out to the guests sitting in the Chapel. The pride and joy reflected on their faces is the nachas a parent is entitled to. There are too few moments in our lives that we are able to relive in pleasure. A wedding is a momentous event, not only to the bride and groom, but to the parents and to the friends and relatives attending. The parent spends more generously for these moments and is eager to share the joys with those who have been close to him.

A child who denies this to his parent takes from him, perhaps unintentionally, a moment from his life. It is a time, too, that the child realizes the closeness of the parent and the love of each for the other. He faces a moment of truth that serves to strengthen the bond between them. He feels a gratitude to which he never gave voice before. This, the wedding serves to produce, and it is all to the good. It is the wise child who goes along with the wishes of the parent because he understands that the "Wedding Day" does not belong solely to the bride and groom. It is shared equally with those in his life whose desire is happiness for the child.

I, therefore, want to wish all our members and their families a healthy and peaceful 1973.


