How do we, as a nation, solve our economic ills? In 1929 there were 5 million investors in stocks; now more than 30 million. "The aggregate value of New York Stock Exchange securities in September, 1929 was \$89 billion; now that value is roughly 10 times greater." Prices now are set by a union wage scale and not by the availability of plentiful labor, and the wage scale of one union is tied to that of another union. The firemen want the same wage scale as the policemen, the plumbers same as the electricians. A fixed percentage mark-up over cost, in any retail business, is the prevailing price of an article. Steel prices have been rising automatically with wage increases. "Prices and wages are set relative to each other," as a keen observer states it. Dow Jones averages dropped from 1005.04 on (Continued on Page 2)

November 20, 1972 to 609.59 the same day in 1974. The oil cartel, after quadrupling its already monopolistic oil prices, grows more powerful while a billion people, or ¼ of the world's population, "go to bed hungry at night." (Fertilizer in farming "comes in large part from oil and natural gas.") Industrial plants are not ro-tooling; residential construction, which is a barometer of economic health, is idling; consumer durable goods are begging for buyers in full-page newspaper ads. But is stagflation really uncontrollable?

The first 100 day period in Roosevelt's first administration turned despair into hope and laid the foundation for the impossibility of a catastrophe measurable to a degree in magnitude that precipitated it. We still vacillate between policies of saving money and spending money, raising taxes and cutting taxes, boosting the investment tax credit for business and lowering it, first raising and then lowering the Federal Reserve discount rate. We are still trying to cure inflation with unemployment and unemployment with traditionally inflationary measures. "This dilemma cannot be explained by accepted economic theory." We do know that the poor are getting poorer. As Ralph Nader computes it, "corporate income tax payment as a percentage of federal receipts have been withering away from 33.6 percent in 1944 to an estimated 14.6 percent in 1974 — while the Treasury take from social security payroll taxes, during the same 30 year period, has risen from 3.9 percent of revenues to 29 percent." The burden of running our government, in other words, rests increasingly more heavily on those least able to carry it. Perhaps our problems lie in the minds or hearts of our decision makers. Confused leaders cannot lead. Experts in the same area must argue convincingly against each other's positions because they hold diametrically opposite views.

But directions do exist toward which our leaders can and must focus their attention. If a federal infusion into the public sector of our economy of \$100 billion through deficit financing is required to revive its sluggish and unsatisfactory pace now, rather than too little or too late or both (Mr. Ford recommends a \$16 billion tax cut which Congress intends to double) then responsible leadership must grasp the reins of authority with decisiveness and despatch. If stopping the give-away to special interests can help, then congressional machinery must legislate the filibuster out of existence. (The oil depletion allowance, perhaps the granddaddy of all raids on our Treasury, may be cited as a case in point.) If wage and price controls can contribute to a solution(which historically have not worked only because enforcement laws were not sufficiently stringent, or even meaningful), then let us stop treating them as sacrosanct untouchables. Revising tax laws so that they fall less on those least able to bear their burden, a system of national unemployment insurance for those who want to, and can, work (approximately 97% of American labor), full national health insurance, a guaranteed annual wage, licensing and supervising multinational corporations, could, among a myriad of more deliberately investigated ideas, solve our cyclical economic peaks and depressions. If times produce the man, and the advisers with whom he surrounds himself (remember Roosevelt and his young lawyers?), then America today provides the challenge.

Since we in Judaism believe that neither heaven nor the stars control the destiny of man but that only man in his G-D given free will is the master of his own fate then we must not lose hope. The ingredients necessary for our leadership to possess are, of course, compassionate concern for all their fellow men (rather than special interests), a healthy respect for human sensibilities and need, a humility that recognizes our transient
