


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From The President

The evening had about it an aura of respect, anticipation, camaraderie, hope, religion and realism. It was the largest attendance in the history of formal dinners for the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, held at the New York Hilton on Sunday, May 11th. The dignitaries encompassed the orthodox rabbinate from synagogues covering the area from Seattle, Washington to New York City, their religious lay leaders, national, state and local government officials and representatives from the State of Israel, including Mr. Joseph Tekoah, its ambassador to the United Nations.

Speakers were extolling the fine work that was and continues to be done by the Union in such areas as Kashruth, youth work, education among the ever-widening ranks committed to orthodoxy, and in aid to Israel. The high watermark of the evening came when Mr. Tekoah reached the microphone.

Of course, the traditional Jew has always drawn from his tragic past so that he may live today in the hope of a better tomorrow. But hope in a distant future, as we now rapidly approach the holiday of Shevuoth, has definitely turned to a world of realism, according to Mr. Tekoah. Inspite of Kissinger's failure in his unilateral peace mission endeavors, these interrupted efforts will be continuing. What efforts? Why, his peace efforts! Note, says Mr. Tekoah, the word is "peace!" The Arabs are listening to non-belligerency talks,

which means peace agreements — however severe their territorial demands for the realization of such agreements. The very nature of "such a word" has altered the atmosphere and tenor of discussion. Deliberations on steps toward peace, methods for bringing it to fruition, whether bilaterally between individual nations or collectively in a Geneva Conference, are concrete, definite, understandable movements in a world of reality.

Mr. Tekoah also related a most meaningful story told to him by a non-Jew. Our planet was to be submerged in a cataclysmic deluge within 10 days. All adherents in every religion were called separately. The Pope in Rome advised immediate prayers, and for the next 10 days, in preparation for the world of Heaven and H-ll. The Council of Churches in the Protestant denominations called the faithful to prayer for the next 10 days. The orthodox Jewish rabbinate in Israel called for prayers and strongly advised that Jews still had 10 days in which to learn how to live under water!

The hors d'oeuvres, drinks and a sumptuous dinner satisfied the gourmands and epicures, and the evening was also productive of much food for thought.

The Rabbi Opens The Gate

Man's desire to learn is ageless. It has toppled civilizations; it has changed the mores of the world; it has rebuilt, strengthened, and created new civilizations. Just as sun gives light to the world, knowledge is the torch that opens the mysteries of life and bathes the world in its light.

We are told that knowledge is power; not the power that destroys and enslaves; not the power that casts gloom and wretchedness, and leaves only misery in its wake. Knowledge is the gift that elevates man and distinguishes him from the common, the ordinary the plodder, whose blinders bind him to only one course.

The desire to learn is ever present. In our early lives we spend almost a score of years in the world of education. We learn the rules, the guidelines and the laws by which we are governed. In those years we are equipped with the tools we use for the rest of our lives, so that we may "make a living," and find our place, our niche in society. In the ensuing generation of years the pursuit of knowledge is muffled, shelved to some corner, while the "practical" takes over.

In the next stage of life we find ourselves "short-changed." Suddenly we discover ourselves facing a void, and we begin to see a need for a broader education. The three "R's" become isolated, alone, adrift. Puzzled, we study this phenomenon, hoping to find the solution. And just at this precise moment in life, Rabbi Schwartz politely "knocks at our door," and subtly suggests the answer to our enigma.

He opens to our eager, hungry eyes, visions of a new world — dynamic, glamorous, appealing to our chauvinism. He shows us the broader spectrum of education, and that man should widen his horizons, and that the pursuit of knowledge is pronged in many directions. And that one should not neglect the path that teaches you the heritage of your religion, and that leads you to the

fountain of wisdom from which drank our sages, our Rabbis, and our philosophers.

Rabbi Schwartz, in his wisdom, has perfected a curriculum that has generated praise and gratitude from a grateful adult student body. He has you dip into the field of Basic Judaism; the Bible; Hebrew — speech and "davening"; the Mishna; the Gomorrah. You sit at the feet of Rabbi Schwartz and you learn the wisdom of the ages. You are transfixed by a people whose culture is rich, and indelible, and undying, and inspirational. With every fiber of your being you drink in with ravenous gulps the history of a people intertwined with life itself.

Our Rabbi is ably assisted by the Rebbitzen, who herself has also instilled in her students the enthusiasm to learn and to absorb. Between them, they have so motivated us that our reaction to their stimulus is one of eagerness and anticipation. So interesting and thought provoking have the classes been, that the word has spread in our Parkchester community. "Graduation," or closing exercises brought over 100 of us, all adults, sharing in the nachas and in the simcha of receiving our diplomas from the Rabbi.

Each of us was proud to step forward, as our name was called, and we acour Certificate and humbly cepted thanked Rabbi Schwartz for having made all this possible. The Rabbi has opened the door. We have seen what lies beyond. It is now up to us. Our degree of perfection is directly related to the effort we ourselves put in. Just as one seeks his livelihood, so shall he pursue his quest for knowledge. Rabbi Schwartz admonishes us that every person should try to obtain as much knowledge as he can get. One should not say he can't do it; that he has no background.

We thank Rabbi Schwartz for "opening the gates" and for offering us another opportunity to satisfy our thirst for knowledge. We look forward to continue our education after the summer hiatus.
